### **Letter from the President**

During April, there were several reports of violence and gunfire in surrounding business areas and near Mayfair Park. The greatest concerns arose from attacks at Brudder's Bar & Grill, 3600 N. Pulaski, and Bart's Coins & Collectibles, 3900 N. Pulaski. Police at the 17th District report that these weren't random attacks, but arose from specific circumstances, and are not representative of a general rise in violence in our community. Investigations are underway in those instances. In addition, a teenager was recently arrested near Mayfair in connection with gunfire heard near the park. We'll try to monitor these events, but clearly, everyone should be cautious and aware of their surroundings at all times. Also, don't hesitate to call 911 when needed.

At our last meeting, we continued the discussion regarding numerous issues and continuing neighbor dissatisfaction with the lack of progress and manner of construction at the Citgo station at 4251 W. Lawrence. Additional issues discussed included missing stop and parking signs, trucks and cars parked illegally on parkways, business signage obstructing sidewalks and public ways, and the absence of a public playlot or park in the portion of Mayfair located east of Elston Avenue.

Several members had previously volunteered to meet with Alderman Laurino and to conduct a coordinated 311 effort on these issues. We've had some success through these actions, including greater scrutiny of the gas station construction, replacement of several signs, and the beginning of discussions with the alderman regarding playlot considerations and identification of potential locations among properties currently listed for sale. If you're interested in these matters, please attend our next meeting to find out how you may help.

Members also addressed pending zoning and development issues related to traffic, parking, and safety concerns associated with renewed efforts to convert the former Enterprise Auto facility on Elston north of Lawrence into a community center. The next Zoning Board of Appeals hearing, which will address this zoning request, is currently scheduled downtown for 2:00 p.m. on June 17. This matter will remain a

continuing agenda item of discussion for future meetings, including our next meeting scheduled for 7:30 p.m. on May 12 at the Irish American Heritage Center. We hope that you're able to join us.

Finally, a big thank you to Tom Keating and Wally Eliasen, who coordinated this year's Spring Clean-Up, and to all the volunteers who came out April 16 to spruce up the neighborhood.



## **Update from the Alderman**

Please let me take this opportunity to thank everyone who participated in Chicago's citywide Clean and Green Event, which was held on April 16. Your efforts to clean and beautify our community are greatly appreciated.

Are you considering having a garage sale after doing some spring cleaning? Please remember to pick up a garage sale permit in my public service office. Filling out the application only takes a few minutes. There's no charge for the permit, and you only need to bring proof of residence (e.g., driver's license, state ID, or utility bill).



Don't ignore the orange streetsweeping notice; it's posted at least one day in advance on a parkway tree or neighboring fence. Your neighbors will appreciate the clean sweep, and you'll avoid that orange ticket!

Just a reminder: street sweeping by the Department of Streets and Sanitation began on April 1. Street sweeping occurs between 9:00 a.m. and 3:00 p.m. on weekdays. Please watch for the brightly colored "No Parking" signs that are posted on parkway trees, light poles, or nearby fences. Failing to comply with these parking restrictions during street sweeping will result in a costly ticket.

### **Enjoy free events at North Park Village**

Members of the Civic Orchestra of Chicago will be at the North Park Village Nature Center (5801 N. Pulaski) on Saturday, May 14. The brass quartet will perform from 11:00 a.m. until 12:00 p.m.

On Friday, May 27, from 4:00 p.m. until 8:00 p.m., North Park Village will host the Late Great Nocturnal Night. You can learn about and look for wildlife that's active at night in the preserve, including raccoons, opossums, skunks, and perhaps even a flying squirrel.

### **Recent City Council activities**

An ordinance I cosponsored passed in the city council, which will allow noncommercial vans and pick-up trucks to be parked on residential streets by the owner's home. A vehicle with a "B" plate—but no lettering or phone numbers—also is allowed to park in a residential area. Consequently, owners of these vans and pick-up trucks will no longer have to come into our office to obtain a special permit. The ordinance becomes effective on May 18.

However, commercial vehicles are still not allowed to park on residential streets overnight, nor are "junk trucks." Please call the office if you have any questions about the new ordinance.

I also introduced an ordinance amendment to lift the packaged goods moratorium that affects stores on Elston Avenue from Kentucky to Cicero, to allow Seafood City to sell alcohol in its new store at 5033 N. Elston.

### Get to know the "Hidden Kerry"

On May 6, Killarney-born author and journalist Breda Joy will transport you to the wild, witty side of Kerry.

Starting at 7 p.m., you'll enjoy colorful stories of a varied cast of characters encountered on the Kingdom's less-travelled paths, who will step out of the pages of the author's book, *Hidden Kerry, The Keys to the Kingdom*, during her reading.

Joy's journey begins at Tarbert on the River Shannon and finishes close to the Cork border under the Paps Mountains.



Stories of Lord Kenmare's doomed mansion (which hosted royal visitors until it burned down), the Moving Bog that swept an entire family to their deaths as they slept, and Big Bertha, who entered the Guinness Book of Records as the "oldest cow in the world," all come to life between the book covers.

Dramas include a daring plot hatched in Dingle to rescue Marie Antoinette, the

tale of the German U-boat that landed Greek sailors on the west Kerry coast, and the gun-running friar beheaded by Cromwellian soldiers on a lonely island.

One section of the book, "A Manner of Speaking," is devoted to Kerry's unique relationship with language, and records many inventive expressions.

Breda Joy has written for *Kerry's Eye* and *The Kerryman* for more than 30 years in her native Kerry. She has written three books, as well as published poetry in literary journals.

The evening with Breda Joy is free, and will be held in the library. *Hidden Kerry* will be available for sale for \$15, and Joy will be happy to sign your copy.

### **News You Can Use**

### **Free Residential Water Testing**

Okay, we're not Flint, Michigan, and Chicago's water mains and pipes aren't made of lead. But older single-family or two-flat homes built before 1986 have lead service lines from the street to the house. With all the recent activity by the Department of Water Management (DWM) in replacing water mains and/or sewer lines—and resulting concerns about knocking loose protective coatings in these lead service lines—Chicago is offering to test the water entering your home to check its lead levels.

To request a free water-quality test, call 311. You'll receive a call back within two business days to schedule an appointment for a water sample to be taken. Results will be provided within three weeks.

If test results show lead levels above 15 parts per billion—the threshold for action—DWM will schedule a return visit, this time accompanied by a plumber and electrician, to evaluate the site, determine the potential source of lead, and recommend an appropriate mitigation plan. If your home tests above the threshold for lead, the city will help you identify the problem and recommend a plan of action to address it.

### **Shredding and Electronics Recycling Events**

If you missed Alderman Laurino's recycling event in April (or arrived too late to get rid of that old VCR that finally kicked the bucket), you can still dispose of your old electronics safely (especially because the sanitation department won't pick up electronics tossed in the alley).

### **Montrose Blue Line Station Work Underway**

"Your New Blue" renovations have started at the Montrose El station. Currently, the O'Hare-bound side of the station will be closed until Tuesday, May 17.



Then, starting at 9:00 p.m. on May 17, then opposite side of the station will close (trains bound for downtown) until Friday, June 7.

That means trains traveling along the closed side of the platform will bypass the Montrose stop during this period. So, until May 17, if you're going toward O'Hare and want to get off at Montrose, you'll have to continue to the Jefferson Park station, then catch a train back to Montrose.

After May 17, if you're going toward downtown and want to get off at Montrose, you'll have to go to the Addison station instead, then catch a train back to Montrose.

Of course, all this riding around will take some extra time out of your schedule, so plan ahead so you won't miss any important appointments.
