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## **Letter from the President**

Ron Duplack

Our last meeting featured a visit with Congressman Quigley, who provided insights on current national issues. He addressed budget challenges, pending election-related investigations, and Democratic attempts to pass legislature that could ensure election integrity and broad-based participation. He also noted that he was in town to conduct special review of delivery and theft issues plaguing the postal service.

Alderman Nugent addressed a variety of community issues, including street paving efforts through the 39th Ward, speed light cameras along Cicero and Lawrence locations within the 45th Ward, and installation of stop signs at Kedvale and Wilson. We noted that the Park District is looking to confirm a ribbon-cutting at the new Playlot at that location on Saturday, November 13, and will advise once a time is confirmed. We discussed the possibility of whether bump-out and other garden maintenance might be funded at least in part through SSA or TIF funds, and whether such funds, or a participatory budget request, could fund a Fall 2022 sculpture installation at the Playlot.

Kemora Landscapes is currently transforming its location at 4635 W Lawrence through new painting and signage, installation of a cedar fence and entry points on Knox and Lawrence, with perimeter landscaping to follow. We applaud this investment in our business district.

Finally, we noted that because of Covid it's been over a year since we have had a physical meeting. Attendees indicated that they have been fully vaccinated and inquired about when we might meet again. After discussion, we elected to forgo our December party and instead to move it up a month and hold an outdoor event on November 10. See the top of this page for the time and location. ## **Membership Meetings**

Here are some more details from the September and October meetings of the Mayfair Civic Association.

## **Congressman Quigley Updates**

### Postal service delays and thefts

Congressman Mike Quigley attended the October membership meeting and highlighted the problems that the city is having with postal service thefts and delays. The Congressman attended an October 15 congressional field hearing on the issue in downtown Chicago, requested by Congressman Danny Davis, entitled "Waiting on the Mail: Postal Service Standard Drops in Chicago and the Surrounding Area". Congressman Quigley indicated during the membership meeting that about 75% of Chicago's mail is delivered on time, and that it's typical for 100-150 mail routes across the city to go either partially or entirely undelivered. He said the issue was partly due to resources and partly due to management, and that the City wants to hire about 700 additional personnel but are only halfway there. When Covid hit, first-class mail volume went down 42% while package delivery went up 120%, and the postal service delivers more packages than all commercial delivery services combined.

### **Check your passports**

Congressman Quigley wanted to remind people to check their passports. Many people haven't checked in a while, but if your passport expires within 6 months of travel, you'll likely not be able get it renewed in time, as the wait can be anywhere from 8 months to a year.

## Possible sculpture for Mayfair Park or Kedvale Playlot

Ron Duplack, President of the Mayfair Civic Association, mentioned having recently been involved in the installation of a number of sculptures in Ronan Park in his role with the North River Commission, an MCA affiliate organization. In the course of his involvement on the project, Ron also worked with Chicago Sculpture International, an organization that supervises and administers installation and removal of the sculptures, contracting with the artists to provide insurance, etc.

There are a couple of sculptures that will become available for Fall 2022, and Ron raised the possibility of engaging the community about supporting installation of a sculpture in either the Kedvale Playlot or Mayfair Park. There is a total cost of \$5,000 per sculpture that would need to be raised, including \$2,000 for installation and removal, with \$3,000 going to the artist. Funds could potentially come from a combination of SSA contibutions, Participatory Budgeting, and/or community donations.

## **Questions for Alderman Nugent**

### Funding for bump-out garden maintenance

The issue was raised during the October membership meeting of funding for maintenance of the bump-out gardens around the neighborhood. The gardens were installed by the City a number of years ago, and community members have been maintaining them largely on their own. However, those community members are no longer available for the full work necessary for upkeep of the gardens, and need someone to take over the routine maintenance. We have tried relying on volunteer efforts for garden maintenance in the past, but these volunteer efforts themselves require time to solicit and coordinate, and can't be relied on consistently. This is an issue that have been raised a number of times in past membership meetings and issues of this newsletter.

In the search for funding sources, we've identified an account that has been shared in the past between the Mayfair and North Mayfair neighborhoods to store donations for beautification. Mayfair hasn't needed the funds for a while because community members have been doing the work on their own, and the account management seems to have changed. We are working with the Alderman's office and North Mayfair representatives to determine the current account manager, and whether there are funds available for our purpose.

Another possible source of funding for garden maintenance might be the new Pulaski Elston SSA #79, since the Sauganash SSA #62 is used in part to pay for flowers and related maintenance in that area. The Pulaski Elston SSA covers the area bordered by Lawrence on the north, Montrose on the south, Elston on the west, and Pulaski on the east. Funds for the SSA likely won't be available until next Fall, and the businesses participating in the SSA would need to agree to provide the funding for this purpose. The question was raised of whether TIF funds could be used for this purpose, but a representative for the Alderman's office indicated that TIFs are used for different purposes.

It is important to give your perennial beds a layer of mulch around the crowns of your plants to reduce the change of frost heaving. Taking care of these tasks will save you time in spring and help reduce the amount of pest and disease problems you might have to deal with next spring.

## **Updates from the Alderman**

Here are some selections from the Alderman's recent newsletters and communications.

#### Postal service issues

I have been working with Congressman Quigley to address the mail delivery issues in the 39th Ward that are described in the Membership Meetings section of this newsletter. In August 2020, Aldermanic colleagues and I sent the Chicago Postmaster a letter outlining issues in mail service. In March 2021, I sent another letter addressing the same concerns, and I sent a third letter in May 2021. Over the past year, my office has filed over 500 complaints with the Congressman's Office and the USPS. It is my hope that we will see real improvements following the hearing. In the meantime, please contact my office if you are experiencing interruptions in your mail delivery. ## **Participatory Budgeting Cycle 3**



I am excited to announce the kickoff of the third cycle of Participatory Budgeting (PB) in the 39th Ward!

PB is a democratic process in which community members directly decide how to spend part of the public budget, also known as the "menu". "Menu money" is ward-specific money that aldermen allocate to specific needs across the ward. I am setting \$500,000 aside from the menu for PB again this year. PB in the 39th Ward is a three-step process:

- 1. Idea Collection Residents submit infrastructure project ideas that they would like to be funded from the 39th Ward's Infrastructure Improvement Funds.
- Review of Infrastructure Project Ideas The PB
   Committee reviews infrastructure project ideas and determines what projects will be on the community ballot.

3. Community Vote - 39th Ward Residents, age 14 years and older, vote on the community ballot. The infrastructure projects that receive the most votes, which add up to \$500,000, will be funded.

We have partnered with <u>PB Chicago</u> to develop a new online forum to collect ideas, share information, and vote! This page makes it easier to submit ideas and projects for the ballot. You will need to sign up for an account to access the platform. You can sign up and submit an idea here: <u>PB</u> <u>39</u>. Idea collection runs through November 18th!

## 2022 Budget

On Wednesday, October 27th, I voted "yes" on the City of Chicago 2022 Budget. This budget outlines how we will rebound from the pandemic, meet pension obligations, and expand social services that complement existing city services. Below are a few highlights for the 39th Ward.

Public Safety remains a top priority. As I keep fighting for more officers, I am also advocating for critical investments in technology. For example, Strategic Defense Support Centers (SDSCs) bring police officers and data analysts together to help make policing safer and smarter. SDSCs are designed to help police make decisions with increased intelligence and understanding. The 17th District has had an SDSC since 2019. Last year I secured funding for an SDSC in the 16th District that recently became operational. This budget supports more Police Observation Devices (POD) and license plate readers (LPRs) for the POD cameras throughout the 39th Ward. POD cameras with attached LPRs feed critical information to SDSCs. The 2022 budget also closes the \$377 million gap in retroactive police pay and adds \$1 million for officer wellness.

## 2022 Budget (cont'd)

Last year, I started working on a cost-sharing flood control program with colleagues. Many homeowners in our ward are fearful that heavy rains may flood the sewer system and overflow into their basements. This budget includes a carveout for a shared-cost flood control pilot program that will assist 39th ward residents in protecting their homes.

In 2020, and in response to the pandemic, the City borrowed \$465 million and planned to borrow another \$500 million in 2021. With help from federal grants, we can pay back the \$465 million from last year and avoid the need to borrow this year. This grant prevented another dangerous "scoop and toss." For the first time ever, payments for all four pension funds will be based on an actuarial calculation. This payment structure sets us on a responsible path to meet our pension obligations.

This budget also reinvests in vital city services. 30 additional tree trimming crews will be added to help clear the backlog of 311 requests. My office is collecting a list of

long-overdue tree trims. Please call our office to make sure your request is on the priority list. Forestry will also roll out a program to plant 15,000 trees a year for the next five years. Streets and Sanitation will use money from this budget to help replace broken black carts throughout the city.
